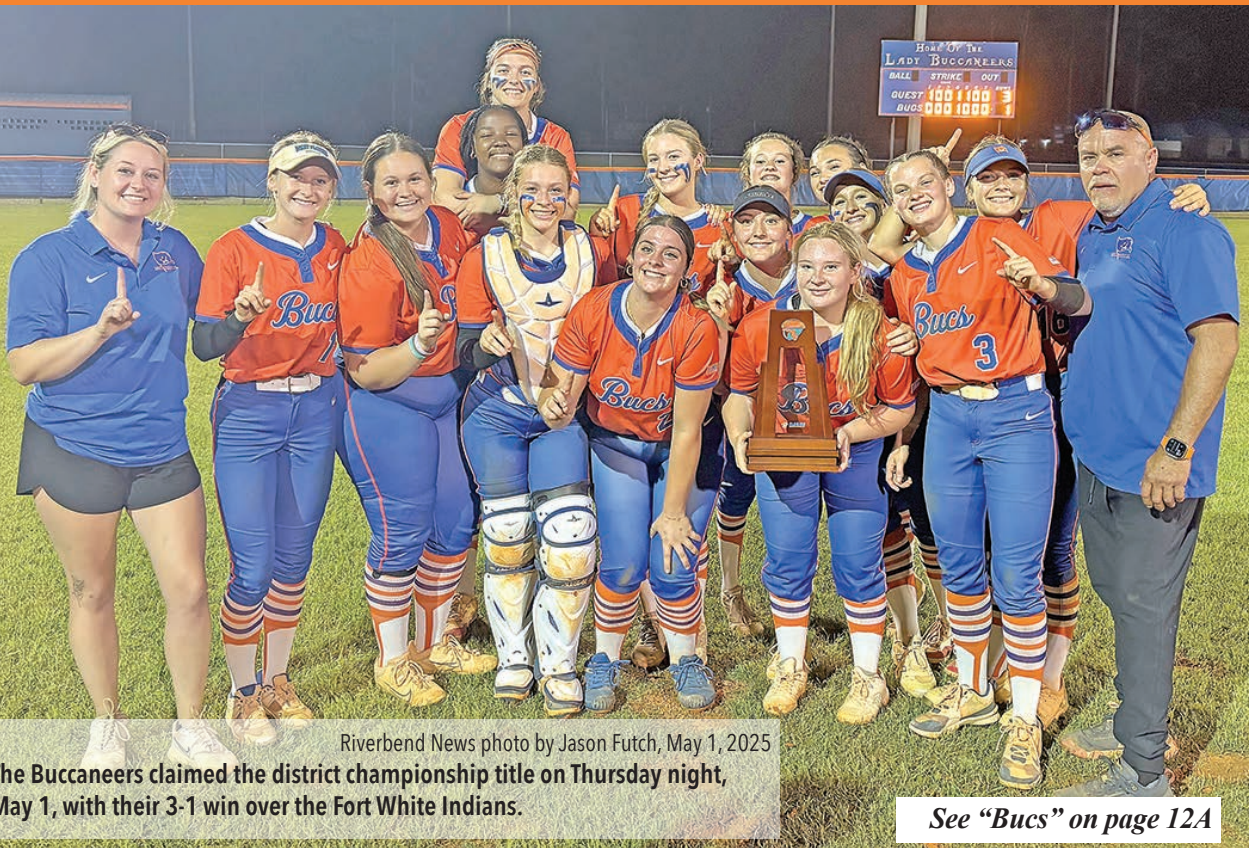


BUCS CLAIM DISTRICT CHAMPIONSHIP BEHIND ARNOLD'S 10-STRIKEOUT PERFORMANCE

Wildflower Festival coming to Live Oak Saturday

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Suwannee Festivals is gearing up for its second annual Wildflower Festival and Plant Sale, which will be held from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. on Saturday, May 10, at Heritage Park and Gardens. The event was popular last year, as over 3,300 people attended the event according to Katherine Jones with the University of Florida Institute of Food and Agricultural Sciences (UF/IFAS) Suwannee County Extension Office. UF/IFAS will be

presenting this year's event, along with Suwannee Festivals.

The festivities will kick off on Friday, May 9, with "Chalk Art on the Trail." The event will allow children and adults to mark up the sidewalk along Heritage Trail from U.S. Highway 90 to Helvenston Avenue while enjoying Scoops Hand Dipped Ice Cream and music. The event will be held from 5:30 p.m. to 7:30 p.m.

Throughout the Wildflower Festival, there will be live music and speakers performing while attendees have an

North Florida Transportation Planning Summit sees record breaking attendance in Live Oak

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City leaders from across North Florida, along with agencies within the region and local citizens, attended the Florida Department of Transportation's 2025 North Florida Transportation Planning Summit, held at the Suwannee County Coliseum in Live Oak on Tuesday, April 29.

The event was initially planned to be held last year but was canceled three times due to the active hurricane season and its effects. The summit was held to showcase several projects FDOT plans to work on throughout the year and into next year while also providing information on grants and elaborating on

emergency response throughout the region. Multiple representatives with FDOT shared that it was the largest-attended summit held since they have been having them.

"We appreciate all the partnerships and state agencies here today to present," said David Tyler, Transportation Planning Manager for FDOT District 2. Suwannee County District 3 Commissioner Travis Land opened the event by welcoming everyone, and fellow commissioner for District 2, Maurice Perkins, delivered the invocation.

"I want to thank Secretary [Greg] Evans and FDOT for allowing Suwannee County to host this event," Land said following the invocation. "It's an honor, and there are so many dedicated professionals who are all focused on the health of North Florida's transportation and infrastructure."

Following Land's comments, FDOT District 2 Secretary Greg Evans delivered a recap of the last two years of emergency response. Evans, who was appointed secretary for the district in February 2012, provided key information about the responses to Hurricane Idalia in 2023 and Hurricanes Debby and Helene.

"We have the greatest communities, and we also have the most rural communities out of any district within FDOT," Evans said, noting that 14 of the 18 counties District 2 represents are considered rural. He also broke down numbers relating to hurricane debris cleanup. During the cleanup of Idalia, for example, Evans said that

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On Thursday, May 1, the Florida Highway Patrol responded to the area of 96th Street and 209th Place, in Dowling Park in response to a single-vehicle accident. According to a report filed by the Florida Highway Patrol, at approximately 7:10 p.m., a beige Acura Sport Utility Vehicle was traveling east on 96th Street. The Vehicle veered onto the southern shoulder of 96th Street, Where the front of the SUV collided with a tree. The driver was later identified as 51-year-old Live Oak resident Michael Sutton. He was taken to HCA Florida Suwannee Emergency, where he was pronounced deceased.

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A controversial plan to develop a piece of property on 11th Avenue in Live Oak has infuriated residents, sparking outrage



and a petition to urge the city to rethink plans to annex it. The plans were first announced when yard signs began to pop up around the city, urging residents of the neighborhood to attend a public meeting at the Suwannee County Coliseum regarding the plans.

The Good the Bad and the Ugly: *A Minecraft Movie*

Introduction: "A Minecraft Movie" was released to American audiences on Friday, April 4. The film is a fantasy action-adventure comedy based off of the best selling video game of all time. Minecraft the movie was directed by Jared Hess and written by Chris Bowman, Hubble Palmer, Neil Widener, Gavin James and Chris Galletta. The film boasts a star-studded cast, with the main ensemble being Jason Momoa, Jack Black, Danielle Brooks, Emma Myers and Sebastian Hansen. The story follows siblings Henry (Hansen) and Natalie (Myers), who have just moved to a new town after their mother tragically passes away. Over the course of their first day in the city, they meet their real estate agent and mobile petting zoo entrepreneur Dawn (Brooks), as well as 1980s video game champion Garrett "The Garbage Man" Garrison (Momoa). The four misfits find themselves sucked through a portal into a new world called the "Overworld." As they begin to explore this new world, they meet "expert crafter" Steve (Black), who helps lead them through this strange new world. What ensues is a hilarious, bizarre and intriguing adventure through a world many have already come to love. **The good:** Let me start by explaining to the older audience why this movie is as popular as it is. Minecraft is the best-selling video game of all time by an extensive margin. It currently holds the number one spot with 350 million copies sold; second place goes to Grand Theft Auto V, which is far behind with 210 million copies sold. To put that number in perspective, as of 2024, roughly 340 million people live in the United States. The game is so popular that, if every single person in the United States bought a copy, that still wouldn't equal the number of copies purchased. Hence, the movie was already going to be successful simply because of the recognition of the name. Now, as for the film itself, there is a lot to like about "A Minecraft Movie." Personally, it reminded me of other comedies by the director Hess; some of my favorites include "Napoleon Dynamite" and "Nacho Libre." It gave off the vibe of early 2000s comedy, a genre that I still love to this day. It is, for lack of a better term, dumb humor; ridiculous humor that is so stupid you can't help but laugh. Yes, sometimes it is fart jokes, other times it's Jack Black singing a dumb song to a wolf - but somehow, it just hits your funny bone. Make no

mistake, this movie is stupid, but that doesn't mean it isn't funny. Both Black and Momoa deserve a shout-out as well for their performances. It was clear that, despite the fact that they knew they were in a dumb movie, they both gave it their all. Both actors put on hilarious performances and put their all into their characters. The rest of the cast did fine as well, those two just stood out above the rest. The visuals of the film, while strange, are



impressive. I assume the majority of this movie was filmed in front of a green screen because the majority of it is a peculiar CGI. However, that doesn't mean it isn't stunning, and it definitely is. The music also hits well, with the common themes that you can hear throughout the game showing up at the right points throughout the movie, along with the classic voice of Black, who has been known for his singing for a long time. **The bad:** Like I said, there is a lot to like about this movie, but there is also a lot to not like about this movie. There is a story with Jennifer Coolidge and a Minecraft villager that, while funny, is unnecessary and stupid. There are a few "hells" and "damns" sprinkled throughout the movie, though not enough that I would feel the need to

cancel the movie for my children. The movie itself is just dumb; that is the way I would describe it. It is just plain dumb. I don't think that necessarily makes it a bad movie, but it is stupid. If you are expecting a deep look into the human psyche, turn to other movies. This movie is about a kid's video game, and it is designed with low-brow comedy and children in mind. The bad section of this review is small because I don't believe there is a lot of bad to say about this movie. It fits perfectly where it is supposed to; it doesn't claim to be anything that it isn't. **The ugly:** All right, I use this section as a parental warning and usually a comment on the film industry in general. Regarding parental warnings, there is not much to be concerned about in this movie. As I said before, there is a small spattering of language throughout, nothing worse than "damn." There are a few characters throughout the film (zombies, skeletons and spiders) that may be scary for some kids. There is also a place called The Nether that is visited a couple of times; it is full of humanoid pig villains and is dark and full of lava. Again, this may be frightening, but only for the smaller audiences. As for what I think makes this film ugly, it's pretty simple. I believe this is a soulless intellectual property cash grab. Even if there are plenty of highlights and some standout performances, I think the heart behind the movie is the most concerning part. I believe the studios in Hollywood are all victims of the same idea that IP is all that is required to make a decent movie. It worries me because, while I enjoyed this movie, it has made a lot of money. I fear that studios will get the wrong idea and continue to throw IP at the wall until something sticks. Finally, while there were some impressive performances, I could feel that some of the actors were phoning it in. **Conclusion:** "A Minecraft Movie" is a dumb movie, a funny movie, a stupid movie, a cheesy movie, a ridiculous movie and all around a good time. It's the perfect movie to take your kids to and laugh out loud. If you approach with the right mindset - that you are walking into a dumb movie designed to hit at your base impulse of comedy - you will walk out having a good time. While I have concerns about the lessons that studios are learning from this, I have to say that I had a great time with my brother and sisters while we watched this movie. I give "A Minecraft Movie" six out of 10 gator tails, making it a recommendation from me.

He also went into specifics regarding response times during Hurricane Debby, a significant rain event that dumped up to 20 inches of rain on the region, and Hurricane Helene, which created considerable debris impacts. During Hurricane Debby, at one stretch of Interstate 10, Evans said that the road had been completely flooded due to no draining systems being in place in the area. “Thanks to Shenandoah Dairy, they allowed us to pump the water into their field, allowing for traffic to be uninterrupted,” he said. Evans also shared photos of sinkholes that developed at Chiefland High School and at a section of U.S. Highway 19 near Fanning Springs.

During Helene, Evans said that FDOT was able to respond quickly to storm debris issues that occurred throughout state highways in Region 2. Using a cut-and-toss method, he said that within 14 and a half hours following Hurricane Helene, 99 percent of the 2,579 miles of state roads were cleared. The remaining one percent was due to power lines being involved, which was not safe for FDOT workers. He also shared that FDOT was able to help a peanut farm in Madison County move equipment safely during the storm and was able to support schools in Taylor, Madison and Dixie Counties with clean up. In total, 6.3 million cubic yards of debris have been removed from the region as of Tuesday, April 22.

approximately eight million cubic yards of debris had been removed from North Florida highways. “One million cubic yards of debris could fill up Ben Hill Griffin Stadium in Gainesville,” he said.

Following Evan’s presentation, Edie Bouza with the Resilient Florida Program spoke about the Florida Department of Environmental Protection funded program, which was created in 2021 as part of the Always Ready Bill. The program assists with planning grants, implementation of grants, regional resilience entities, statewide data set and assessment and helps with the Florida Flood Hub.

Additionally, speakers throughout the event included Steven Carver, Regional Coordinator for the Office of Greenways and Trails through FDEP, Angie Odell with the Florida Division of Emergency Management, Troy Roberts with Suwannee River Water Management District and Lecia Behenna with FloridaCommerce, who each spoke on grant opportunities.

Jeff Sheffield, Executive Director of the North Florida Transportation Planning Organization, discussed the importance of smart technology in transportation planning.

Other speakers included Scott Koons, Executive Director of North Central Florida Regional Planning Council; Carrie Stanbridge, Maintenance Engineer for FDOT District 2; and Lola Butler and Melissa Morgan with FDOT District 2, who provided further information on emergency response plans through the Federal Emergency Management Agency.

The last event of the day was a breakout session, which functioned as an open house for guests to personally visit the speakers and learn more about the topics discussed, along with other organizations from the state and local levels.

however, residents were still not comfortable with the idea and were more concerned about stopping the proposed development.

Based on signage that began to pop up in the neighborhoods along 11th Avenue, residents assumed that the meeting that was held on Wednesday, April 30, would be a neighborhood meeting, where the developers would pitch the development to residents and hear feedback in a presentation setting. Instead, representatives from the civil engineering firm Landis Evans + Partners awaited the crowds in an open-house format, attempting to answer questions from residents as they walked around the coliseum. City staff were there to provide information relating to the general process that is followed according to adopted codes and ordinances.

Live Oak Planning and Zoning Director George Curtis and Planning Assistant Christian Dixon were also present, explaining and answering questions regarding the process that development statutorily follows within the City of Live Oak. “We enjoyed the opportunity that the developer’s consultants afforded to us to participate in their open house meeting,” Curtis said. However, for those in attendance, it was a less-than-enjoyable experience.

“I can tell you it’s not going to happen here,” Moses Clepper said to Margaret Tassone, who was standing near the design plans. Tassone, one of the project planners for the firm, deflected each question about the project from citizens who raised legitimate concerns about it, one of which was privacy. One resident questioned, “How can I expect privacy when there are people living in three to four-story apartments looking into my

complex looks modern and sleek;

fenced-in yard?” Tassone did not respond to the question.

Riverbend News attempted to ask the planners in attendance about the residents’ general response to the plans, but they refused to comment.

Another concerned citizen, McKay Graham, a concerned citizen, started a petition in April to urge city leaders not to go forward with the proposed plans. “I’m not doing it just to do it,” Graham said, citing history with the neighborhood and growing up on Coliseum Avenue. Her mother still resides in the neighborhood, as well as other members of her family. “The proposal will not make the neighborhood safe, and the small community vibes will end.”

Graham said that, while she is not opposed to change and development, the proposed Oak Haven project was not planned well. One of the biggest complaints is privacy, one that Graham is not alone in.

Ashley Staley, who lives in a home at the Oak Haven property line, expressed her concerns about privacy, noting that the development would be able to look into her backyard. “They are not taking into consideration traffic and safety,” Staley said. “I’m not against development, but it should not be taking place in a largely residential community.”

Donna Ragan, who has lived in her home on Coliseum Avenue for decades, showed *Riverbend News* the property line in her backyard, saying that the closeness of the proposed project is concerning to her. “I am worried about property values in this neighborhood,” Ragan said. She is also worried about the traffic issues that could wreak havoc on the area, as well as potential flooding. “The property has flooded a lot, especially during Hurricane season,” she said, citing the floods that occurred during Hurricane Debby last year.

Another concerned citizen, Judy Deas, said that the project should not be considered. She stated the infrastructure around 11th Avenue and County Road 136 was unsuitable for handling the changes in traffic and development. “This is something that should not even be considered, especially with the limited roads to service people,” she said. Deas added that, even with the current state of traffic on 11th Avenue, it is difficult to maneuver.

Sam Leneave, who has resided in Live Oak for 12 years, said that he left cities like Tallahassee and Gainesville for a small-town feel. He believes that the development of Oak Haven would threaten that vibe. “I just want to live a slow life,” Leneave said. “If I wanted to deal with bad traffic, I would have never left Gainesville.”

As residents continue to voice their opposition to the project, Curtis said that there will be more opportunities for residents to make their voices heard. “At all city meetings where voting will take place, there are opportunities for public comment or input,” Curtis said. “All city meetings where voting decisions are made are 100 percent open to the public, many times advertised ahead of time in the newspaper, noticed through the city clerk’s office, and in many cases, with red and white public hearing signage posted at the subject property 10 or more days prior to the first meeting.” Curtis also said that, regardless of how mundane or controversial the proposal may be, the Planning and Building Department staff provide services and facilitate the processing of development requests in an equitable manner. “We continue to provide the development review and permitting processes for the City in a professional and legally ethical manner,” he said.

For residents like Ragan, one of the questions asked is what the return on the investment would be. “Would

that mean more taxes for residents? How long would it take for the return,” Ragan questioned. “It should be something that benefits the city and the county.”

So far, the petition against the proposed project has reached over 1,300 signatures, which will be presented to the city council at its upcoming meeting on Tuesday, May 13, at 6 p.m. at City Hall. Graham plans to bring the petition, along with facts and data, to support the claims of the residents disgruntled by the project. “People are talking about selling their properties because of this,” Graham said. “People who have lived in their homes for decades don’t want this and are now considering uprooting because of it.”

Dhruv Development, the firm assisting Live Oak Investments with the project, has made numerous investments throughout the state and elsewhere. Based in New Port Richey, Fla., Dhruv Development is run by Vijay Patel, who has owned gas stations and hotels throughout the state. Patel could not be reached for comment.

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Charter confusion arises amongst new White Springs Town Council

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On Thursday, April 24, the White Springs Town Council held its organizational meeting for the newly elected town council. After the vacating of the council by the previous administration, elections were held, and four new individuals were elected: Tonja Brown, Robert Gamsby, Cheryl McCall and Nicole Williams. The organizational meeting was called in accordance with the town charter, which reads, "On the first Thursday after the election, or any date established by resolution of the Town of White Springs, Florida, the new council members shall be sworn into office, and an organizational meeting shall be conducted for the purpose of acquainting the new members with procedures and transferring authority from the outgoing members."The meeting began with Attorney Leslie Jean-Bart administering the oath of office to the new administration. After that, the council had internal elections for the new mayor and vice-mayor at which time Brown was elected mayor and Williams was elected vice-mayor. After the elections, Mayor Brown took over control of the meeting.

"First, let me thank you all for electing me as mayor," she said. "This is not going to be an easy task for us, but we are all going to work together at this." She then requested that the council oppose the agenda they had been provided. "We are new elected officials; we have not had anything like this come up before us. I am not going to re-enter into a meeting or a discussion with this. We are here to do one thing and that is to be sworn in and to elect the mayor and vice-mayor, that's it. We are not discussing anything on this agenda. We will talk about it later on down the line, but right now, we don't need to discuss anything on this agenda." Brown then requested a motion to close the meeting. However, Vice-Mayor Williams stated she would like more information on the item regarding acquainting the new council with procedures. "May I ask the question of the town attorney before we close out?" Brown responded, saying the new council didn't know anything about the item to which Williams clarified that was her point; she wanted clarification from the town attorney on what was involved. Councilman Gamsby asked Brown if she was trying to make a motion to table the agenda for the special council meeting. Brown responded in the affirmative. Gamsby continued, asking, "Are you also trying to table 'acquainting with new procedures?'"

"The reason why that's on the agenda is because that is in the charter as what is to take place during the organizational meeting is acquainting the new council with procedures," said Town Attorney Jean-Bart. The portion of the charter that Jean-Bart was referring to is Section 2.05 Procedures (a) (1), which reads, "... an organizational meeting shall be conducted for the purpose of acquainting the new members with procedures and transferring authority from the outgoing members."

Confusion arose amongst the council, with Brown stating they were only supposed to swear in the new council members and elect the new mayor and vice-mayor. "I want to make sure that we follow the charter exactly. That's why that's there, because...those are the exact words," Jean-Bart replied.

"We are not going to discuss this tonight. This is not supposed to be on the agenda at all," Brown stated. "It's just two things. I'm aware of how this is supposed to go, and that's it. We're not supposed to have no discussions about no agenda or nothing like that."

"If in our town charter it has that we have this 'acquainting with procedures' for the swearing-in...then if it's in the charter, we need to follow the charter," Williams spoke up. "I'm in agreeance with postponing the regular council meeting because we have not been informed."

Brown then asked if the council had been presented with any procedures. Gamsby chimed in to say that they had been provided a manual, and to his understanding, Jean-Bart wanted to review the manual with them.

"This is not the time for that," Brown responded. "Listen, I already know what it's supposed to say, okay? This is not my first rodeo on this; I never did this. We never discuss anything when you are sworn in and elected. So all we can do right now is table everything and come back in May and discuss what she has on the agenda."

McCall then spoke up, saying, "We already all have this booklet, so what is there to discuss if she already gave it to us, right?"

Gamsby then asked the attorney, "She's just going to explain it," Gamsby said before turning to Jean-Bart. "There's no action items in this, correct?"

"Correct, it's just to make sure that the citizens know what you guys have been provided with so that they are made fully aware of where we stand and what's

going on. That's all," Jean-Bart replied.

Brown stayed strong in her stance, however, saying she wasn't opposed to doing that during the May meeting, but she wanted everything tabled until then This was followed by some internal discussion on how motions work and how they die. First, the council tabled the agenda for the special called council meeting scheduled for after the organizational meeting. The agenda was to be brought back up at the regularly scheduled meeting in May.

"Councilmembers, I want to let you all know that the madam attorney or the town manager does not make special meetings for us," Brown said. "We make our own special meetings; they don't do it for us."

The council then moved on to the procedures item due to the motion to table it failing. However, Brown voiced her opposition to the item once more, and McCall seconded the opposition. Once more, the council became confused about the matter. Brown continued arguing that the item should not be on the agenda, while Williams claimed that its in the charter so it should not be ignored. The motion passed, with only Gamsby voting against tabling the item. The meeting was then adjourned without a vote or public comment.

Then, on Thursday, May 1, the White Springs Town Council held an emergency meeting to discuss three different items.

The first item on the agenda was to discuss the signature authority for town financials. Mayor Brown opened the conversation by stating she had gone to the bank to discuss the signature cards for town financials. The bank had told her that, in order to remove the previous signees and put new ones on, the town had to have a council meeting with minutes clarifying that the council had chosen to do that. Brown wanted to remove Anita Rivers, Jacqueline Williams and Ray Vaughn as the signees and add herself, Nicole Williams and another council member. Gamsby asked why the council would remove Vaughn, to which Brown responded that she had spoken to CPA Richard Powell, who had told her that Vaughn should not be using it and only council members should be signees. She also clarified that the council could choose to put Vaughn back on as a signee if they decided to do so later. After some more discussion, the council elected to remove Vaugha, Rivers and Jacqueline and add Gamsby, Brown and Nicole.

The second item on the agenda was a discussion regarding the town attorney. Brown started by saying she had talked to the Florida League of Cities, and the group was willing to help out the town, as Attorney Jean-Bart had put in her resignation. Her last day would be Tuesday, June 24. The council asked if Jean-Bart would stay on until they could find an attorney, and she responded in the affirmative.

The final item up for discussion was discussion regarding the Town Clerk position, as the previous Town Clerk had resigned her position. Nicole started by recommending that the town temporarily promote Cynethia Williams, the current utility clerk, to the position. Jean-Bart clarified that, per the town charter, the town manager is supposed to hire the town clerk; however, in an emergency such as the one the town is currently in, they can offer an interim position to someone. Some public comments pointed out that the Florida League of Cities would most likely offer interim town clerks and town managers. Eventually, after more discussion, the council decided to table the item until the next regular meeting. The meeting was then adjourned. The following White Springs Town Council meeting will be held on Tuesday, May 13, at 6:30 p.m. The location is yet to be announced.

Audit finds Suwannee County School District fiscally sound for 2023-24 year

According to the Florida Auditor General's report, the Suwannee County School District recently received clean findings in its annual financial audit for the fiscal year ending June 30, 2024.

The audit, prepared under the direction of Auditor General Sherrill F. Norman, assessed the financial activities overseen by then-Superintendent Ted Roush and school board members Jerry Taylor (Chair, District 1, now retired), Norman Crawford (District 2), Tim Alcorn (District 3), Ed daSilva (Vice Chair, District 4), and Ronald White (District 5).

Key financial findings showed the district's net position increased by \$565,609, "a 4.1 percent increase over the 2022-23 fiscal year," to a total of \$14,210,012 as of June 30, 2024. The district's revenues for the fiscal year totaled \$82.97 million, with general revenues comprising \$72.85 million—or 87.8 percent—of that amount. Program-specific revenues, including charges for services and grants, made up \$10.12 million, or 12.2 percent. Property tax revenues increased compared to the previous

year, generating \$11.29 million for operational purposes and \$4.26 million for capital projects.

The district's expenses totaled \$82.4 million, with instruction accounting for the largest share at \$41.8 million. The report notes that "instruction expenses represent 50.8 percent of total governmental expenses in the 2023-24 fiscal year," reflecting a 17.6 percent increase over the previous year due to "an increase in salaries and related benefits and an increase in net pension expense."

The district's General Fund balance grew to \$8.51 million by the end of the fiscal year, which was up \$1.36 million from the previous year. Of that amount, \$5.99 million was unassigned. The audit links the increase to "continued cost containment measures implemented by the District to include cutoff of all nonessential expenditures; adherence to strict budgetary controls; and transitioning General Fund expenditures to the Special Revenue – Federal Education Stabilization Fund."

The audit also highlighted the impact of state funding increases and a \$4 million appropriation from the Public Education Capital Outlay trust fund designated for the expansion

of RIVEROAK Technical College. The report attributes the increase in capital grants and contributions, which rose by more than \$4 million, to this PECO funding.

Additionally, the audit reviewed compliance with major federal programs, including the Child Nutrition Cluster and Student Financial Assistance Cluster, and found that "the District materially complied with the requirements that could have a direct and material effect on each of its major Federal programs."

At the fund level, the audit showed that the district's total governmental fund balance increased by \$2.43 million to \$18 million as of June 30, 2024. The General Fund's assigned and unassigned balances equaled 13.6 percent of total General Fund revenues, reflecting a healthy reserve position.

In its management discussion, the district credited its financial position to a combination of state funding increases, effective cost controls, and transfers of eligible expenses to federal pandemic relief funds.

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CareerSource North Florida recently hosted its Coffee With a Veteran event at Mayo Subs. can help get Veterans services for those new injuries.

Walker, who is the Veterans Affairs officer for Lafayette County, provides services to local Veterans and can also help with benefits and other resources. As an Air Force Veteran, Walker said he was familiar with some of the struggles servicemen and women face when they return home from service. He hopes that, in his position, he can help Veterans transition and obtain the help they need. “Whatever a Veteran in Lafayette County needs, I am their guy,” Walker said.

Francis said that CareerSource, based in Taylor County, will continue to host public events within its service area, hoping that Veterans will take advantage of the opportunities available to them.



Honoring the heart of the home: *A Mother’s Day tribute*

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Mother’s Day has been acknowledged as one of the most popular holidays in the United States. Celebrated yearly on the second Sunday in May, it is a day where families across the United States pay tribute to the matriarch of the family and shower her with love and gifts. It also acknowledges the positive contributions that mothers have made toward their families.

A fun fact about the holiday is that, according to Town & Country Magazine, it is the day when the most telephone calls are made across the country.

Mother’s Day was originally a concept of Ann Jarvis, who organized a committee in an effort to reunite families separated by the Civil War. The day was called “Mother’s Friendship Day.” Ann wanted to expand on this concept and start working toward a larger campaign to bring mothers together, but passed away in

1905 before her efforts could evolve. Other efforts to start an annual day for mothers were made by Julia Ward Howe, author of “The Battle Hymn of the Republic,” who led an anti-war demonstration called “Mother’s Day for Peace,” on June 2, 1872. Howe created the event to "appeal to womanhood throughout the world." The movement has been known as the Mother’s Day Proclamation, though it has no ties to the modern-day Mother’s Day holiday. The events continued in Boston, Mass. for 10 more years until the movement fizzled.

Ann Jarvis’s daughter, Anna Jarvis, took the mantle from her mother and with the help of Philadelphia, Penn., merchant John Wanamaker, created the holiday in its modern form. In 1908, it was reported that New York City had widely celebrated the event.

Over the years, Anna petitioned for the holiday to become a national one. West Virginia was the first state to adopt a resolution honoring Mother’s Day in 1910. The rest of the states soon followed before Congress began to notice the growing movement.

On May 10, 1913, the U.S. House of Representatives urged all federal government officials, including the president, to wear a white carnation the following day in recognition of Mother's Day. The idea gained further support the next year when, on May 8, 1914, Congress passed a law officially designating the second Sunday in May as Mother's Day and called for a presidential proclamation. President Woodrow Wilson responded the following day by declaring the first national observance of Mother's Day, encouraging Americans to display the flag in honor of mothers who had lost sons in war. Later, in 1934, President Franklin D. Roosevelt approved the release of a commemorative stamp to mark the occasion.

Over the years, the holiday has paved the way for intense commercialization. From flower sales to greeting cards, it has produced a sizable income for businesses throughout the United States to thrive on Mother’s Day. Americans spend approximately \$2.6 billion on flowers, \$1.53 billion on pampering gifts—like spa treatments—and another \$68 million on greeting cards. Restaurants also tend to be busy on Mother’s Day.

The roots of Mother’s Day run deep, tracing back generations through history, tradition and heartfelt gratitude. While the origins of the holiday may vary across cultures and time, the sentiment remains the same—a dedicated time to honor the love, sacrifices and strength of mothers everywhere. Whether you're celebrating with a warm hug, a phone call, a quiet moment of reflection or a cherished memory, take the time this Sunday to recognize the women who have shaped our lives. 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Author Spotlight: Roy Mike Mullis

Roy Mike Mullis has lived a life of creativity that has translated both on music sheets and into a novel that he is proud of. “DUMALA”, a science fiction book that he wrote alongside Live Oak native Joyce Marie Taylor, is an example of the creativity that he shines a light on.

“The ‘DUMALA’ story came to light basically by just letting my creative imagination run wild at times,” Mullis said. “I worked on the story on and off for several years as a science fiction idea, and I would add notes and ideas into a journal that I kept with me, and the ‘DUMALA’

story ideas just kept increasing.”

“DUMALA”, Mullis’ first and only book, was published in 2010 by CreateSpace Independent Publishing but has recently seen new life, as an audiobook project is in the works. “It is a long and arduous but exciting process,” Mullis said. He signed the contract with the Audiobook Network in early March and shared that he hopes to have the audiobook available in Spanish as well. Once the audiobook conversion is done, it will be available on Apple, Audible and Amazon platforms worldwide.

“DUMALA” tells the story of Becky Rogers, a young woman who wants to make the world a better place. However, when she is made aware of a life-altering situation about to take place, she finds herself in the middle of it all. The story also introduces readers to a lineup of characters who help Rogers on her journey, including Mickey DeRosa, a linguist, and ancient history professor Doc Wiggins.

Mullis, born in 1960, was adopted into a loving family and grew up in Alachua County, residing most of his life in Jonesville and graduating from Newberry Junior/Senior High School in 1979. He recalled the times he would accompany his mother, Hazel, on her newspaper delivery routes for the Gainesville Sun for the first 15 years of his life. “Looking back on it, it was a unique experience, and it brings a smile to my face as I reminisce about the hilarious shenanigans my Mom and I experienced over the years on the paper route,” he said.

Mullis is a talented musician who has fronted and played in several bands throughout his career, including WhooWhee and his current band, Faster Than Flash. Known for his musical versatility, he writes his music and plays multiple instruments, including the drums.

Mullis calls Lake City home but has worked in 44 states. Each time he left North Florida, he was drawn back to the area's beauty. “I always come back,” he said.

After the audiobook is completed, Mullis hopes to send it to several Hollywood outlets to explore the possibility of turning the science-fiction work of art into a feature-length movie. “Ninety-eight percent of my readers who have enjoyed the print version have also stated that ‘DUMALA’ would make an excellent movie,” Mullis said. He also hopes to push the marketing and promotional aspects of the book to help make this happen.

While he has no plans to write a sequel for the book, Mullis said that there are openings within the story where one could happen. He said that his work to make the book into a movie has prevented him from writing another book, but he has not ruled out the possibility of it happening.

During Correctional Officers Week, institutions nationwide host appreciation ceremonies, award presentations and recognition events. These gestures are not only expressions of gratitude but also a means to raise morale and reestablish the principles of working together and upholding honesty in the profession. It is a moment to remember the bravery that it takes to enter a prison every day, knowing that your presence affects in ways most will never become aware of.

By celebrating correctional officers, the community reaffirms its shared commitment to justice, safety and rehabilitation. Behind each uniform is a person. Their commitment must be honored not only in a week of celebration but year-round honor and support.

While observing this special week, take a moment to give genuine thanks to corrections officers everywhere. They are the unsung backbone of the justice system: hard, even-handed and instrumental to the security of communities and the rehabilitation of the men and women who are behind bars.

"This enables individuals with disabilities to live fuller lives and integrate into their community," Reddy said.

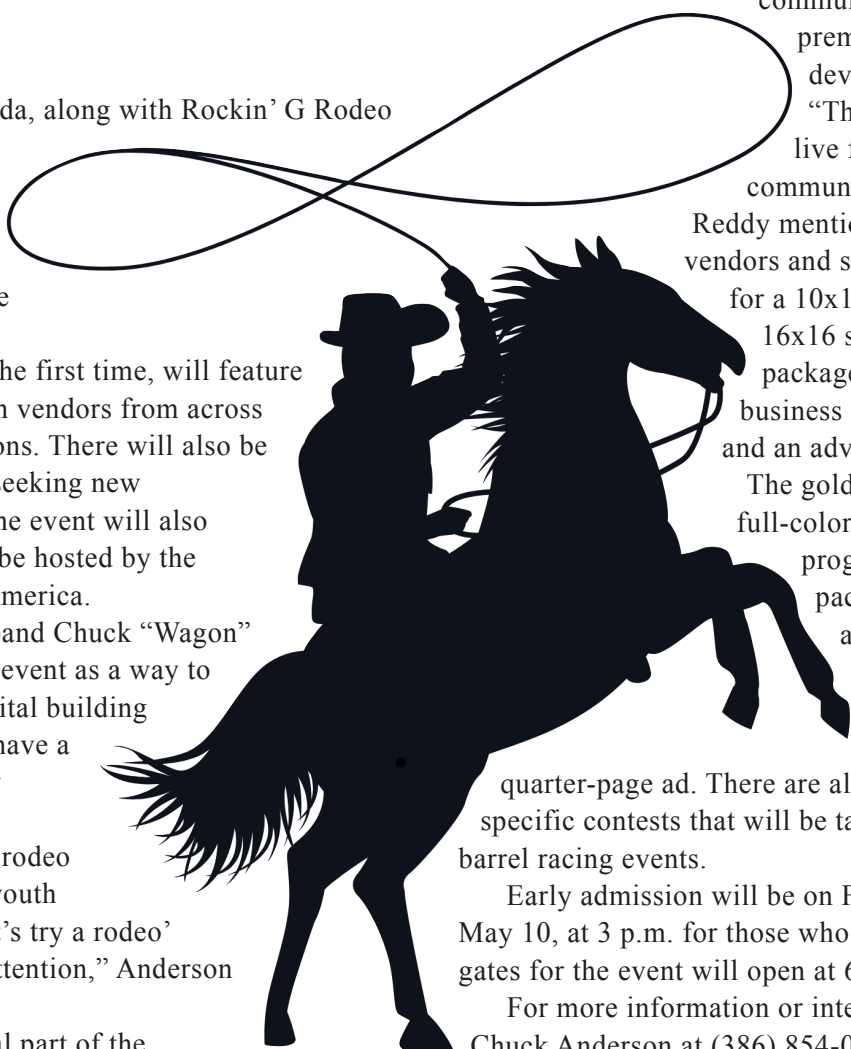

The Suwannee County Division of Emergency Management will be hosting an Emergency Preparedness Day on Wednesday, May 7. 'it's never gonna happen here' is now changing."

Over the last two years, Suwannee County was impacted by three hurricanes, which devastated the county and other areas within the Suwannee Valley. The events triggered mutual aid events, which brought multiple resources to the county from across the state and country.

Henderson wants to make the event more impactful and has been planning out the logistics of the events for months, which will also feature special vendors. Some of those vendors will include the American Red Cross, HCA Florida, FEMA, Small Business Owners Association and more. There will also be literature available for both English and Spanish

speaking residents. Agricultural representatives will also be available to assist farmers and agricultural programs with information related to emergency preparedness.

Henderson stated that the event will give residents an opportunity to sign up for Everbridge, the emergency alert system that will send alerts to users' phones. There will also be an opportunity for residents to sign up for the Suwannee County Emergency Response Team (CERT).

"We will have different educational things that are there to give people information about being prepared not only for hurricanes, but disasters in general," Henderson said.

Hurricane season is starting; here's how to be prepared

Hurricane Preparedness Week may be one of the most popular in the State of Florida. Celebrated annually in May, the week aims to raise awareness for preparedness for those at risk of hurricanes. Originally, the week was called Hurricane Awareness Week; however, in 2004, this was phased out with the reasoning that someone can be aware without being prepared. Of course, the reason that Hurricane Preparedness Week starts in May is because that is the beginning of hurricane season.

The United States has been the victim of hurricanes for an incredibly long time, with records dating back to 1851. The deadliest hurricane in U.S. history

was the 1900 Galveston hurricane, which killed between 8,000 and 12,000 people. Of course, who could forget the past two years when the tri-county area suffered from Hurricanes Idalia, Helene and Milton? Hurricanes are something that Floridians know all too well; however, that doesn't mean that Floridians don't need reminders to prepare.

There are three easy

ways to observe Hurricane Preparedness Week. First, create a disaster plan. Everyone needs one. Sit down with your family, and come up with a plan. Figure out where shelters could be, what the best evacuation routes are, and what additional ways to communicate with each other could be. Make sure each member of your family is up to date on the plan and knows their role in case of an evacuation.

The second step is to fortify your home. Make sure that your home is sturdy enough to handle a hurricane. Look up hurricane building specifications from your local government and make sure that your home is up to date. It is also wise to prepare for other hurricane effects, such as flooding and tree damage.

The third and most important step is to gather supplies. You should have enough supplies to make it through the hurricane period. This includes at least three days' worth of non-perishable food and water per family member. In addition, hurricane kits should include a first aid kit, personal hygiene items, flashlights with extra batteries, battery-operated radios, a waterproof container with cash and important documents, a manual can opener, a lighter, matches, books, magazines, games, pet supplies, baby supplies, a cooler and ice packs.

Remember, the effects of a hurricane can last for weeks, even months. Power can be out for extended periods of time, phone lines can be taken down, roads can be flooded, and people can get trapped. Preparation for such an event is key to preventing loss of property and even life. Remember, you can never be too prepared for a hurricane.

This year, Hurricane Preparedness Week falls in the first week of May, specifically from Thursday, May 1, until Wednesday, May 7. While it has not been announced yet, there is also usually a tax relief period for those buying items in preparation for a hurricane. Keep an eye out for an announcement of this tax relief period.

There are an infinite number of ways to celebrate teachers. *Riverbend News* has a few different ideas to help us show gratitude to the educators in our lives.

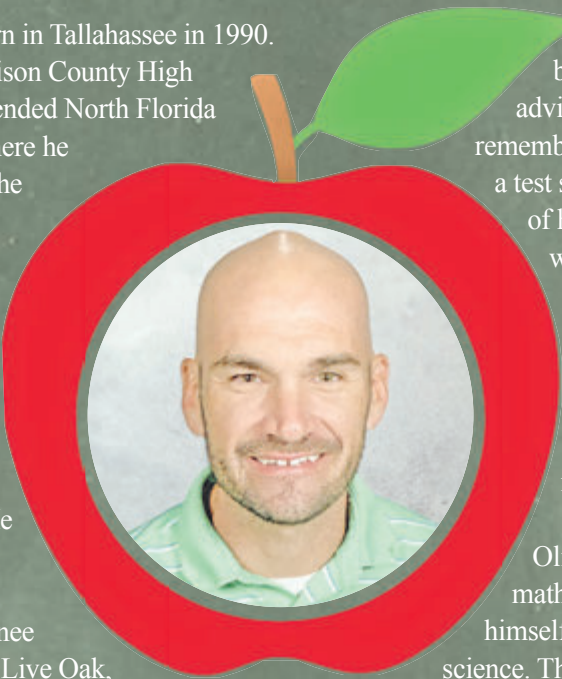
- Organize a rotation of families volunteering to bring coffee, baked goods, and even lunch for the week for a teacher

Teacher Spotlight: April Crawford

April Crawford is a fifth-grader math and science teacher at Suwannee Pineview Elementary. She was born in 1977 in Live Oak and graduated from Suwannee High School in 1995. After graduating high school, Crawford attended Saint Leo University and graduated in 2002 with a Bachelor of Arts degree in Elementary Education. However, her journey to become an educator began long before high school and college.

"I wanted to become an educator because of the bond I had with my first-grade teacher here in Suwannee County," Crawford said.

"Being a very timid and anxious child, she made me feel safe, comfortable and confident even years after being in her classroom. Over the years, my love for learning grew, and I felt the calling to become that person for other children like me." This inspired Crawford to pursue education, volunteering in an elementary school during her second year of college. That was all she needed, and her path changed from pharmacy to education.



Crawford has been teaching for 23 years. She started in Union County, where she taught for 19 years. She even earned District Teacher of the Year in 2009. For the past four years, she has been teaching in Suwannee County. "I spent all those years teaching math and science. These were always my two favorite subjects when I was in school. I have taught fifth and sixth grades for over 23 years. This is my favorite age range because of their fun and sassy personalities." She continued talking about the joy she gets from teaching, saying, "My favorite part of being a teacher is connecting with my students and building relationships. Every day is different and offers an opportunity to be a difference maker for someone."

As Crawford reflected on her experiences, she

spoke about the advice she has for both upcoming teachers and students. For teachers, she had three pieces of advice. The first is to build strong relationships with students and "always keep them as your main focus." Second, she advises teachers to collaborate. "Find your people and learn from them," Crawford said. "You will grow as an educator faster than you ever could alone." Her final piece of advice for her fellow teachers is to "Continue learning yourself." She also had a piece of advice for her students and all students in general:

"Always give your best in all that you do and focus on your progress, not on perfection." Crawford continued her reflection, saying, "My greatest accomplishment as a teacher is creating a positive classroom climate that keeps students engaged and feeling loved. My students may not remember everything I've taught them through the years, but they will always remember how I made them feel."

Her favorite book is "Charlotte's Web," as she grew up on a farm and always related to the character Fern. "Growing up, I always imagined the animals on our farm were good friends like Charlotte and Wilbur," Crawford said. She also commented on how beneficial technology has become to her as an educator. "It allows me to enhance my lessons beyond the classroom and adapt them to individual learning needs."

However, her greatest pride coems from her former students, who remember the lessons they learned in her class. "I am most proud of having students come back to me years after being in my class and remembering their learning experiences like having Science Fear Factor or dressing like surgeons for our math operating room. These are memories that allow me to remember 'why' I continue to teach, especially on those challenging days,"

Crawford said. "It's important as a fifth-grade teacher to remind myself that, even though they are the 'big' kids of our school, they are still kids, and they love a good story time or a test review egg hunt, or just singing a math song. They also love to make fun of my drawings and pick on me for being a Seminole fan. These are some of the things that make me love who I am when I'm with my students." She wrapped up her comments with gratitude, saying, "I am so thankful to work with some of the best teachers and human beings I know. My school family works hard every day to make the children in Suwannee County feel loved and valued."

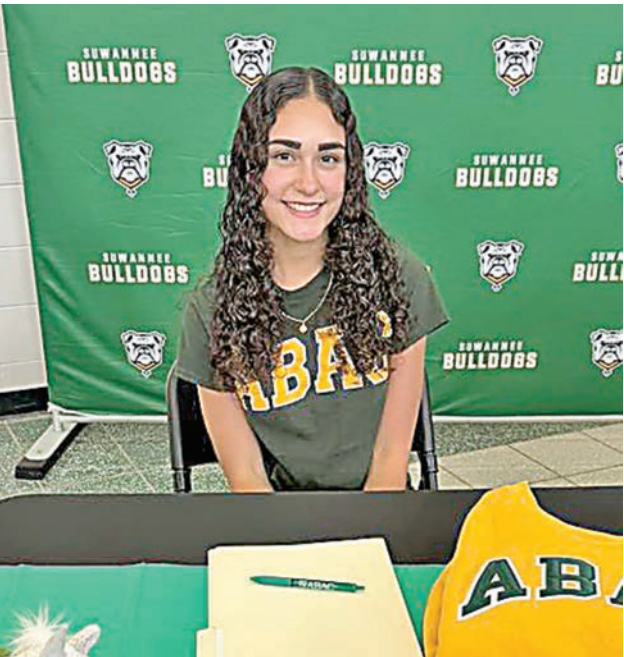

Behind a dominant outing from pitcher Laila Arnold, the Branford High School varsity softball team defeated the Fort White Indians, 3-1, on Thursday night, May 1, effectively claiming the district championship title.

Arnold struck out 10 batters and allowed just one run on five hits over seven innings, leading the Buccaneers to the win. She issued only two walks in the complete-game effort. "She was exceptional as always," Coach Oscar Saavedra said about Arnold's performance. "She doesn't get rattled. She trusts her defense and is able to get out of any situation."

The Buccaneers struck early, plating a run in the top of the first inning when Victoria Swain singled to drive in courtesy runner Danielle Whitfield. Swain continued to spark the offense throughout the game, finishing 4-for-4 with two runs batted in.

"Victoria has helped jumpstart the offense," Saavedra said. "She is strong at the plate, sees the ball well, and is able to produce when needed."

In the fourth inning, Swain doubled and scored on a sacrifice bunt from Hunter Revis to extend the Bucs' lead to 2-0. The Indians responded at the bottom of the inning with a solo home run to center field, cutting the deficit to 2-1.

The Bucs added an insurance run in the fifth when Swain's second RBI single of the night brought home Jesse Frierson, pushing the lead to 3-1. Frierson also collected two hits, going 2-for-4 at the plate.

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Remembering Suwannee:

Mobilization and service in

“The War to End All Wars,” Part 6

We are nearing the end of our nearly two-month-long study of Suwannee County’s mobilization and service in World War I.

By February of 1918, Suwannee County’s eligible men from the first called draft were, for the most part, already off to serve. However, due to continued racist feelings throughout the country at that time, African Americans had not yet been allowed to go to war. That would soon change, leading to a larger role for this oft-marginalized group in World War II and beyond. This was pointed out by the Suwannee Democrat using language of the day that would be found offensive today by some (my apologies in advance):

“The remainder of the men called to arms by the first draft will leave for camp on Feb. 23.

“In this county all of the white men in the first draft have already gone, and the call will take about 60 colored men who have heretofore been examined and accepted by the government.

“Notice will be given each man by the Local Board in time for him to arrange matters so that he can be on hand and ready to join the colors.”

In early April, nine more Suwannee County boys left for training at Camp Jackson, South Carolina. However, not every Suwannee County unit was deployed. A late April 1918 article noted, “The Fifth Coast Artillery of Live Oak will present a Mammoth Home Talent Minstrel at the auditorium for two nights the early part of next month.”

Meanwhile, the First World War continued. Near-weekly updates in the local newspaper told Suwannee County citizens how the fight was progressing, especially as American forces entered the fray en masse. By the end of May 1918, another newspaper article noted the requirement to enlist:

“The young men of Suwannee County becoming 21 years of age since June 5, 1917, were called upon to register on June 5 and enroll for the great

struggle against German forces. There were 161 for this county, registered by the local board yesterday. “Among that number was one alien, a citizen of Denmark. Of the number registered 93 were white and 68 Negroes.”

Suwannee County soldiers continued to train in the United States as June arrived. The Democrat reported, gleefully and proudly it seems: “Word comes from Macon that Mrs. Jas. P. McCall is singing for the soldiers at Camp Wheeler this week, upon special invitation from the YMCA officials.

“Her first concert Monday night was held for the enlisted men, but upon special invitation, Capt. Joe Hinely was present, and led in the wave of enthusiasm which swept the crowd, when Suwannee River was sung, hundreds of men joined the chorus when Capt. Hinely characteristically shouted ‘Boys let’s join in on the chorus, with Mrs. McCall because she lives on the Suwannee River and so do I’.”

The final chapter in this saga comes next week...

Wherefore lift up the hands which hang down, and the feeble knees; And make straight paths for your feet, lest that which is lame be turned out of the way; but let it rather be healed. Hebrews 12:12-13

SHORN, WASHED, AND FERTILE

Thy teeth are like a flock of sheep that are even shorn, which came up from the washing; whereof every one bear twins, and none is barren among them. Song of Solomon 4:2

One of the most needful things for the body is the consumption of food that is both ample and proper. By nature, however, we are inclined to indulge this natural appetite to excess, and to often eat things that are not really healthy for us to eat. While we recognize these things to be true, we also know that it is the LORD “who giveth us richly all things to enjoy” (1 Timothy 6:17). We are to use the world but not abuse it or allow ourselves to be abused by it (see 1 Corinthians 7:31). We are in the world but not of it.

Throughout the LIFE of the LORD JESUS, HE baffled HIS disciples as they saw HIS complete mastery over HIS fleshly appetites, often fasting, praying and laboring long hours. One such incident occurred as the LORD met with the woman at the well in Samaria. It was about noontime and the disciples had gone on into the city to buy food. But the LORD remained at the well in order to fulfill an appointment with this woman which only HE knew about. “Now Jacob's well was there. Jesus therefore, being wearied with his journey, sat thus on the well: and it was about the sixth hour” (John 4:6). When they returned, they were quite incredulous that HE, being a Jew, was conversing with this Samaritan woman (see John 4:27). As she left, they (seeing HIM wearied from the journey) pressed HIM to eat some food. “In the mean while his disciples prayed him, saying, Master, eat” (John 4:31). HE answered them saying, “I have meat to eat that ye know not of” (John 4:32).

They had no idea what HE was talking about as they reasoned among themselves in their carnal minds. “Therefore said the disciples one to another, Hath any man brought him ought to eat” (John 4:33)? HE answered them, saying, “My meat is to do the will of him that sent me, and to finish his work” (John 4:34). Job, in his imperfection, was led to manifest the meaning of the LORD’s words. “My foot hath held his steps, his way have I kept and not declined. Neither have I gone back from the commandment of his lips; I have esteemed the words of his mouth more than my necessary food” (Job 23:11-12). Job could not have known that he would speak these prophetic words which expressed the SAVIOR’s perfect desire in this matter.

We now see (even as I am sure HIS disciples came to understand) that HE was restating HIS determination to do HIS FATHER’s will, which HE counted of more importance than the indulgence of HIS own fleshly desires. As HE fasted and prayed for 40 days in the wilderness prior to HIS temptation by Satan, HE was hungry. “Being forty days tempted of the devil. And in those days he did eat nothing: and when they were ended, he afterward hungered” (Luke 4:2). It was then that Satan confronted HIM with this, “If thou be the Son of God, command this stone that it be made bread” (Luke 4:3). HE replied; “It is written, That man shall not live by bread alone, but by every word of God” (Luke 4:4). Surely HIS “meat” (i.e.; food) was indeed to do HIS FATHER’s will and fulfill HIS purpose. Nothing would sway HIM.

We are ashamed when we consider how often we, as sinful men, do count the indulgence of our flesh sometimes more highly than that to which we are called. Our blessed LORD has illustrated most clearly by HIS own actions and EXAMPLE that which Paul writes of: “If ye then be risen with Christ, seek those things which are above, where Christ sitteth on the right hand of God. Set your affection on things above, not on things on the earth” (Colossians 3:1-2). He goes on to remind us of those who have no regard for such, “For many walk, of whom I have told you often, and now tell you even weeping, that they are the enemies of the cross of Christ: Whose end is destruction, whose God is their belly, and whose glory is in their shame, who mind earthly things” (Philippians 3:18-19).

It would be an understatement to say that the scriptures are written with highly figurative and poetic descriptions. This is not done by accident and I believe a disservice is sometimes done to the people of GOD by those who insist on “translating” the scriptures in a fashion which, in many cases, does away with this illustrative and figurative language, in order to, supposedly, simplify our understanding. As Solomon writes this book, he is led by the SPIRIT to describe the LORD’s relationship and interaction with HIS bride in language which is quite colorful and sometimes mysterious. But this is by design and not unintentional so that we might be reminded of the most glorious and mysterious union that the bride of CHRIST has with her BRIDEGROOM. This is the description of HIS intimate relationship with her.

HE speaks of her “teeth” as being like a flock of sheep. This could be a description of her beauty as HE looks upon her. Or it could be pointing out that the sheep of the LORD’s pasture are not as a ravening wolf, whose teeth are sharp and meant to tear and rip its food. Rather, the sons of GOD are called to be kind, gentle and reflective, doing all things as unto the LORD. “Whether therefore ye eat, or drink, or whatsoever ye do, do all to the glory of God” (1 Corinthians 10:31). They are not to be ruled by their “appetites.” The SPIRIT of GOD would lead them to recognize the desire of their flesh to have rule over them and to flee to HIM for aid. “All things are lawful unto me, but all things are not expedient: all things are lawful for me, but I will not be brought under the power of any. Meats for the belly, and the belly for meats: but God shall destroy both it and them. Now the body is not for fornication, but for the Lord; and the Lord for the body” (1 Corinthians 6:12-13).

Then the LORD describes HIS flock as “shorn.” Sheep which have their wool removed are indeed a peculiar sight. So too are those sheep of HIS pasture who are “shorn” by the HOLY GHOST who is sent into the world to convince them of sin (their own), righteousness (HIS alone) and judgement (certain). This convincing work is performed upon the sheep of HIS fold by the SPIRIT of GOD. All of them, without exception, are persuaded by HIM that they have no righteousness of their own. They are indeed made sinners in their own sight, as shorn sheep. Like Hart wrote in one of his hymns:

“To understand these things aright, This grand distinction should be known:
Though all are sinners in God’s sight, There are but few so in their own
To such as these our Lord was sent; They’re only sinners who repent
What comfort can a Saviour bring To those who never felt their woe?
A sinner is a sacred thing; The Holy Ghost has made him so.”

New life from him we must receive, Before for sin we rightly grieve (by Jos. Hart, #89 Gadsby’s Hymns)

HE said HIS sheep “have come up from the washing.” Shorn sheep still need cleansing. The man who knows himself to be a sinner, will desire to be cleansed by HIM who alone can wash away sin. When Nathan (sent by the LORD) had led David to see his sin, David was compelled to seek the LORD saying, “Wash me thoroughly from mine iniquity, and cleanse me from my sin. For I acknowledge my transgressions: and my sin is ever before me” (Psalms 51:2-3). His desire was not simply to be reformed in his outward actions but to have a deep cleansing of the inner man which can only be performed by the LORD. “Create in me a clean heart, O God; and renew a right spirit within me” (Psalms 51:10).

It is a glorious thing to behold the working of GOD’s SPIRIT in the sons of GOD, as HE renews their mind and brings about repentance and faith. “That ye put off concerning the former conversation the old man, which is corrupt according to the deceitful lusts; And be renewed in the spirit of your mind; And that ye put on the new man, which after God is created in righteousness and true holiness” (Ephesians 4:22-24).

Yet as wonderful as this “renewal” is, it would not occur nor have any basis upon which it might be sustained were it not that they were washed in the blood of the everlasting covenant. Their true cleansing is seen in the work which the LORD JESUS has performed for them as their SUBSTITUTE, MEDIATOR and REDEEMER. “Forasmuch as ye know that ye were not redeemed with corruptible things, as silver and gold, from your vain conversation received by tradition from your fathers; But with the precious blood of Christ, as of a lamb without blemish and without spot” (1 Peter 1:18-19). Therefore our praises are ever given “Unto him that loved us, and washed us from our sins in his own blood, And hath made us kings and priests unto God and his Father; to him be glory and dominion for ever and ever. Amen” (Revelation 1:5-6).

As those “kings and priests,” the sons of GOD are made to be “neither be barren nor unfruitful in the knowledge of our Lord Jesus Christ” (2 Peter 1:8). It is as the sons of GOD are brought to know HIM that their barrenness is taken away. “And this is life eternal, that they might know thee the only true God, and Jesus Christ, whom thou hast sent” (John 17:3). Are you one of these sheep? Is this your prayer? “That I may know him, and the power of his resurrection, and the fellowship of his sufferings, being made conformable unto his death” (Philippians 3:10). HE is the SHEPHERD of the sheep; shorn, washed, and fertile. mam

What to watch: “House of David” slingshots to the top

It is rare for a secular streaming service to provide quality biblical content, but Amazon Prime has succeeded with "House of David," which began streaming in February. In just over two weeks, the series netted over 22 million views. While the series is not strictly biblical, the key components of the story of King David are accurately portrayed. The fictional additions to the story add to the intensity of its depiction. Part of what makes this production so effective is that the storyline is sensible and creative.

Nothing about "House of David" appears cheap or hurried. The plot is well thought out, and each of the eight episodes of Season 1 leaves viewers anxious to view the next episode. For those offended by the ventures into historical creativity, consider that much of the biblical story is left to the imagination. For example, David's early relationship with Saul's daughter, Micah, has almost no depth in scripture, so the producers create a love story for the young couple, which is fantastically presented.

The other embellished scenes and

storylines are of equal quality, including the depiction of Goliath's family and heritage. Also, the relationship that slowly develops between King Saul and David is intriguing and believable. David never loses respect for his king, though he is clearly losing his mind. Creators Jon Erwin and Jon Gunn are to be commended for their ability to capture their



audience with a compelling story that manages not to offend believers with their creativity. Nothing in the series detracts from the importance of the story of David or casts Christians in an intellectually poor light for believing. By the end of the final episode of Season 1, viewers will be cheering for the inevitable defeat of Goliath, which is depicted masterfully.

Due to the overwhelming success of "House of David," it comes as no surprise that the series has been renewed for a

second season and possibly more. Estimates for the release of Season 2 are late 2025 or early 2026. The next season will explore David's leadership journey and rise to the throne.

This show has the potential to draw unbelievers into exploring the Bible to see the importance of David's journey and to examine their own path of faith. That, alone, would make "House of David" a worthy investment.
